### Summary

### Purpose

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The Metropolitan Water District Administrative Code Section 11102 provides that each department head is authorized to join organizations whose purposes serve the interests of the District. Each department head may approve payment of dues of any such organization so long as annual dues are \$10,000 or less. New organizational memberships over \$10,000 require Board approval. Each department head shall annually report to the Board the exercise of authority granted by this section.

### Detailed Report

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Metropolitan holds memberships in various organizations that support its mission, policies, water management priorities and operational objectives. A complete table listing all memberships and their costs by group for Fiscal Year 2022/2023 is included in **Attachment 1**. The total cost of dues or fees for all organizations was approximately \$6.37 million.

This includes memberships in the organizations for which Metropolitan has contractual rights, as follows:

- State Water Contractors (\$3,491,715)
- State Water Project Contractors Authority (0)<sup>1</sup>
- State Water Contractors-MWQI Committee (\$258,289)<sup>2</sup>
- Colorado River Board-Six Agency Committee (\$871,680)
- Colorado River Authority (\$0)<sup>3</sup>

Metropolitan holds memberships in five organizations with annual dues of \$100,000 or more, and 15 organizations with annual membership dues ranging from \$25,000 to \$99,999. These memberships are captured in **Attachment 2**.

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<sup>1</sup> The State Water Project Contractors Authority (SWPCA) formed in 2003 as a joint powers organization of interested SWP contractors. As of July 18, 2018, Municipal Water Quality Investigations (MWQI) was the only active specific project committee. The SWPCA Board of Directors placed SWPCA on hiatus due to the lack of activity. Therefore, SWPCA assigned its agreements and functions for the MWQI specific project committee to the State Water Contractors (SWC), the committee's original location before SWPCA was formed.

**MEMBERSHIP DUES \$100,000 OR GREATER****FISCAL YEAR 2022/23****California Council of Environmental and Economic Balance (CCEEB)**

The California Council for Environmental & Economic Balance (CCEEB) is a non-profit non-partisan association established in 1973 to develop policy solutions on a variety of environmental issues including water quality, transportation, energy, air quality, hazardous waste and land use. The 60-member board includes representatives from business, organized labor and public leaders. Metropolitan joined CCEEB in April 1977, serves on its board and participates on its Natural Resources Task Force. In addition, CCEEB leads several issue-specific projects, including its Air Project, which covers regulatory and legislative air quality issues. [*Water System Operations - \$94,500*][*External Affairs - \$10,000*][*Environmental Planning - \$34,000*]. *Total dues: \$138,500.*

**Colorado River Board -- Six Agency Committee**

Created in 1950, the Colorado River Board Six Agency Committee's function is to support the Colorado River Board (CRB) through the collection and administration of funds to secure the represented agencies' rights and interests in Colorado River system water and power resources. Metropolitan has contributed to the fund since its inception. Membership also includes the cost of annual dues for the Colorado River Salinity Control Forum. [*Water Resource Management - \$871,680*]

**State Water Contractors (SWC)**

Metropolitan has been a member of the State Water Contractors (SWC) since 1982. The SWC is an association that safeguards the rights and promotes the interests of Metropolitan and 26 other State Water Project (SWP) contractors. The organization assures proper and effective operation of the SWP; protects and acquires necessary water rights for the SWP; conducts related studies on the SWP; and addresses specific issues through special funds. *Total dues: \$3,491,715.* [*Water Resource Management*]

**SWC Municipal Water Quality Investigations – Specific Project Committee (SWC MWQI-SPC)**

The State Water Contractors Municipal Water Quality Investigations – Specific Project Committee (SWC MWQI-SPC) provides supplemental services in those areas where DWR is challenged due to need for more experienced staff, state budget-related constraints, or a need for specialized expertise. It also provides an organization and a funding source to procure services and equipment in the event of unforeseen needs, breakdowns, emergencies or other urgently needed services and equipment. The MWQI Specific Project Committee also provides SWP contractors with supplemental Delta water quality services, studies, analysis and information. [*Water Resource Management - \$258,289*]

**Water Research Foundation**

The Water Research Foundation (WRF) is a non-profit, educational organization that funds, manages and publishes research on technology, operation and management of drinking water, wastewater, reuse and stormwater systems to ensure high quality water and improved public water services. The WaterReuse Research Foundation merged with the Water Environment Research Foundation in July 2016, which were then integrated with WRF in January 2018. Metropolitan has benefited from WRF's program in several areas, including development and compliance with regulations such as the disinfectants/disinfection by-products rule and the various surface water treatment rules, monitoring and control strategies for taste and odor compounds and cyanotoxins, detection and treatment of microbial pathogens, perchlorate and chromium 6 research, and water reuse development [*Water System Operations - \$576,684*].

**MEMBERSHIP DUES \$25,000 - \$99,999****FISCAL YEAR 2022/23****Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA)**

The Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) is the largest and oldest coalition of California water agencies. Among other activities, ACWA provides a forum for exchange and dissemination of information and knowledge through various boards and committees, including water quality, water resource management, energy, legal and legislative affairs. Metropolitan regularly participates in workgroups, educational events and advocacy efforts coordinated by ACWA to support Metropolitan's board adopted legislative positions on water policy at the state and federal levels. [*External Affairs – \$61,650*]

**Association of Metropolitan Water Agencies (AMWA)**

The Association of Metropolitan Water Agencies (AMWA) is an organization of the largest publicly-owned drinking water systems in the United States. AMWA's membership serves more than 120 million Americans with drinking water. Member representatives to AMWA are the general managers and CEOs of large water systems. The Association represents the interests of these water systems by working with Congress and federal agencies to ensure safe and cost-effective federal drinking water laws and regulations that protect public health. Metropolitan participates in AMWA policy-making discussions and educational outreach activities on a regular basis. [*Water System Operations - \$28,700*]

**American Water Works Association (AWWA)**

American Water Works Association (AWWA) deals with issues and policies related to the procurement, treatment and delivery of water. The local unit is the California-Nevada section. A number of Metropolitan employees are members of the Association and are actively involved in the activities on the international and national level. Metropolitan has been a member since 1944. [*Water System Operations - \$26,034*]

**California Municipal Utilities Association (CMUA)**

The California Municipal Utilities Association (CMUA) has represented publicly-owned water, gas and electric utilities throughout California since 1933 and is the only association that combines these important utility services. CMUA concentrates on urban water issues. Metropolitan joined CMUA in September 1946. Metropolitan works with CMUA to increase the support and assistance with water issues as well as energy regulations and legislation. [*External Affairs - \$78,843*]

**California Urban Water Agencies (CUWA)**

The California Urban Water Agencies (CUWA) is a non-profit corporation formed in 1990. CUWA is comprised of 11-member urban water agencies and supported by an Executive Director. The mission is to provide a forum for combining the expertise and resources of its member agencies to study and promote the need for a reliable, high quality water supply for the state's current and future urban water needs. Metropolitan has participated in CUWA since its inception. [*Water Resource Management - \$60,000*]

**California Water Efficiency Partnership (CALWEP)**

The California Water Efficiency Partnership (CALWEP) is a chapter of the Alliance for Water Efficiency (AWE). CALWEP is a state organization and AWE is a national organization. These organizations are dedicated to maximizing urban water conservation by supporting and integrating innovative technologies and practices; encouraging effective public policies; advancing research, training, and public education; and building on collaborative approaches and partnerships. Membership fees are for both organizations. [*Water Resource Management - \$40,000*]

**National Water Research Institute**

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The National Water Research Institute (NWRI) is a nonprofit that collaborates with water utilities, regulators, and researchers in innovative ways to help develop new, healthy sources of drinking water. *[Water Resource Management - \$50,000]*

**Underground Service Alert**

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Underground Service Alert provides a call service for public and private excavators at a work site to help prevent pipeline ruptures and promote worker safety. Metropolitan utilizes the service to ascertain clearance to dig, then mark or stake the horizontal path. Underground Service Alert provides simple, safe information to protect pipelines from being damaged and protect its excavators from personal injury. According to California law, every operator of an underground pipeline (or other underground facility) is mandated to participate and share the costs for a regional notification center. *[Engineering Services - \$27,704]*

**Water Education for Latino Leaders (WELL)**

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WELL educates local Latino elected officials about California water policy to promote timely and equitable actions that serve to develop a robust economy, healthy communities, and a resilient environment for all Californians. *[External Affairs - \$25,000]*

**Water Education Foundation**

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The Water Education Foundation (WEF) was founded in 1977 as a nonprofit to provide a wide range of education programs on various water resources and policy issues, including the State Water Project, the Colorado River, water management, infrastructure and conservation programs. WEF also offers a one-year water leader class, water law policy briefings, and other educational programs and curriculum. *[External Affairs - \$45,000]*

**WaterStart**

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WaterStart membership benefits include access to a water technology innovation priority list; access to the Global Funding Pool for pilots that align with the member organization priorities and meet WaterStart's criteria; access to pilot results for other WaterStart members; and access to WaterStart's database of global technology companies. Member organizations are invited to exclusive networking opportunities, and to participate in joint marketing and promotional activities with other technology partners. *[Sustainability, Resiliency and Innovation - \$55,000]*

**Western Urban Water Coalition (WUWC)**

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The Western Urban Water Coalition (WUWC) was established in 1992 by general managers representing the largest urban water utilities in the West. The WUWC members share common interests related to water supply development and water conservation, including an interest in project financing or appropriations from the federal government. Because of its broad, multi-state political base, the coalition is more effective than its members could be on their own to address its initiatives in Washington, D.C. Metropolitan has been a member of WUWC since its inception. *[Water Resource Management - \$40,000]*

**MEMBERSHIP DUES UP TO \$24,999****FISCAL YEAR 2022/23****American Academy of Environmental Engineers & Scientists (AAEES) \$6,000**

The American Academy of Environmental Engineers and Scientists is a not-for-profit 501(c)(6) organization serving the Environmental Engineering and Environmental Science professions by providing Board Certification to those who qualify through experience and testing. Their mission is to promote continual improvement in environmental engineering and science education and practice. The academy provides training through workshops and seminars, participates in accrediting universities, publishes a periodical and other reference material, interacts with students and young professionals, sponsors a university lecture series, and rewards outstanding achievements through its international awards program. *[External Affairs]*

**Asian American Architects & Engineers Association (AAA/E ASSN) \$1,500**
